Below is information sent from NWEA on how to add or change users or roles.

Here are the instructions below for your districts that may need to add additional roles, adding a user and deleting a user. Please feel free to add to your newsletter or send directly to districts.

The power to add additional MAP roles to staff is within your school/district and done by those with either the System Administrator, Data Administrator, or District Assessment Coordinator role as designated in the MAP system.

Give Additional Roles to a User

- 1. Log in to MAP, choose Rostering in the left corner and select Manage Users. Type in name and click search.
- 2. Select name and click View/Update.

- 3. In the User Role section, under Available Roles, select a role that you want to assign this user, then click Add.
- 4. Click Submit.

Add a User

- 1. Log in to MAP, choose Rostering in the left corner and select Manage Users. Type in name and click search.
- 2. Select name and click Create User. Complete fields and roles needed.
- 3. Click Submit.

Deleting a User

- 3. Log in to MAP, choose Rostering in the left corner and select Manage Users. Type in name and click search.
- 4. Select name and click View/Update.
- 5. Click Delete.

** If all of your staff with the MAP system roles of System Administrator, Data Administrator, or District Assessment Coordinator are no longer at your school/district, contact your NWEA Account Manager or Partner Support for assistance.

OPI Early Learning Collaborative

The OPI is creating an Early Literacy Collaborative, in order to support the OPI's implementation of HB 352, a bill that provides for early literacy interventions for identified students leading up to grade three. HB 352 intends for strong collaboration between government agencies, schools, families, educators, educator preparation programs, and communities.

The focus of the OPI's collaborative will be to provide guidance for implementation of the school and home-based literacy intervention programs determined by the Board of Public Education. In addition, the collaborative will provide data and feedback to the Board of Public Education's Early Literacy Advisory Council.
